

1847 ISSUE

On October 8, 1847, the Casa de Moneda asked Perkins, Bacon & Petch to send them the plate of the \$1,000 m/c denomination with 80,000 printed and machine-numbered notes, which was a first for Argentina. The banknotes, printed in orange ink on white paper without watermark, are dated SEPTIEMBRE 1847. By the time of Rosas, only 43,300 notes had been put into circulation. The issue continued until it reached No. 80000 on April 9, 1853. According to the documentation, the issue continued with notes printed locally with the original plates, but with handwritten numbering. However, as no surviving copy is known, it is not possible to say whether the print was orange or black. The engraving is the work of Jacob Perkins himself.

Le musée du Banco de la Provincia conserve une planche de ce billet avec les légendes politiques effacées, mais on n'en connaît aucun exemplaire imprimé.

ÉMISSIONS DE 1848

En 1848, on remplaça les coupures de 50, 100 et 200 \$ m/c, qui avaient fait l'objet de très bonnes contrefaçons. Elles sont encore gravées par Jacob Perkins, de Perkins, Bacon & Petch, et imprimées à la Casa de Moneda en noir sur papier blanc sans filigrane, le verso étant toujours vierge. Perkins, Bacon & Petch avaient livré les planches avec la date partielle, sans la dizaine ni l'unité, qui ont été ajoutées à Buenos Aires. Les légères différences entre le 18 et le 48 s'expliquent de ce fait : il ne s'agit donc pas de contrefaçons. La numérotation est de nouveau manuscrite. Les jours d'émission font suite à ceux de l'émission de 1845, la dernière date ayant été celle du billet de \$ 500 m/n daté du 1^{er} septembre 1845.

Les billets de 50 \$ m/c connus portent deux signatures parmi les cinq suivantes : J. Almeira, Epifanio Marzano, Manuel Núñez, José M. Robles et Francisco Salas.

The notes are signed by Manuel Terry, Juan de Victorica and Bernabé de Escalada in various combinations.

While on a test note marked SPECIMEN, the date is complete, the 48 corresponding to the 18 and well aligned, on the banknotes whose plate was completed in Buenos Aires, the 4 is leaning to left and the 8 is leaning to left and shifted upwards :



In order to ensure better legibility, the number is written to the right of the cartridge provided for this purpose.

1849 ISSUE

The *Archivo y Museo Historico del Banco de la Provincia de Buenos Aires "Dr. Arturo Jauretche"* has a 500 pesos note plate dated 1849, engraved by Perkins, Bacon & Petch, but of which only orange or black reprints made around 1900 are known.

It is assumed that this note should have been issued after the denomination of 200 pesos, but that the plate had arrived only towards the end of 1848 and that with the delay, the year had been completed with 49 instead of 48.

It is almost certain that notes of this type were issued, probably orange and black varieties, which the Bank's books allow us to assume. If there was an issue, it was counted with that of the \$500 note of 1845. Political slogans were never erased from this plate after the fall of Rosas.

Red and black reprints were
made around 1900, and these are
the ones we know.

AGOSTO 1º 1849, black reprint

1851 ISSUE

Perkins, Bacon & Petch engraved this plate that arrived in Buenos Aires on August 22, 1851. The banknotes were printed at the Casa de Moneda in Buenos Aires, in vermilion red ink on white paper with yellow silk threads and a watermark depicting a large radiant sun covering virtually the entire surface of the banknote. This is the last denomination issued with federal legends, and it was put into circulation from the end of 1851 until after the fall of Rosas. At a later date, probably in late 1854, the federal legends were erased from the plate for a new black print.

The exact print run is not known, as these notes have been counted with other dates of the same value. The signatories are Manuel Terry / Bernabé de Escalada or Manuel Terry / Manuel Núñez, and the numbers are added by hand.

Despite great precautions to prevent counterfeits by photoengraving, an almost perfect one was discovered in 1854, probably made abroad. The following details were noted to distinguish the false from the true:

1. sharper printing, index for the use of a new plate ;
2. hive is darker and less sharp, and without the bee that we see entering on the authentic note ;
3. under the border, the L of London touches the border, while on authentic banknotes there is a space ;
4. in the word Diciembre, the top of the r is at the same height as the other lowercase letters, when it should exceed them.
