Ordered in August 1875 to complete the new notes printed in the United States, these low-value notes are dated January 1, 1875 and meet either hand-signed or facsimile for the higher numbers: we know the handwritten signatures of E. Carrasco, P. de Caminos, J. Gasull, J. F. de Paz and M. Rodriguez and the facsimile signature of J. Dam.





This half-real note was printed by Lito. Boldt, Aduana 134, Rosario during the first half of 1878, to meet the public's demand in the face of a lack of metallic money. Chao ranks it as the5thissue.

These banknotes are identical to those of the 2<sup>nd</sup> issue (pp. 10 – 12). The only different references are the acanthus leaf between the name of the city and the cartridge of the series and some details in the engraving (see enlargements). This second issue retains the date of November 1, 1874, although it was not ordered until August 1875.

This note was printed at the same time as the previous one, in the early months of 1881. The signatures of this copy seem dubious, especially given the difference of only 25 between the serial number of this note and the remainder shown below. The printer took over the general arrangement of the obverse of the banknote printed by ABNC° (PS-816 / SF-3E-4), while replacing the central vignette and the portrait of Alberdi. The reverse is new, but much cruder.

As with the 10 pesos denomination, Fleuti took over the model printed in 1875 by ABNC<sup>o</sup>. This time, only the guilloches and the frame have changed. It should be noted, however, that the quality of the printing was much worse.



The difference in quality between intaglio and lithography is particularly visible in the details of the portrait.



Chao cites contemporary press articles as the introduction of two previously unpublished denominations, 2 and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  Bolivian pesos, probably printed in June 1881, on the eve of the reform of the Argentine monetary system, could seem unusual. "The new issue that is circulating has not stopped to amaze to some extent, as we believe it does not address the need to facilitate the trade and that this is what trade needs to the small transactions." The province obviously uses this artifice to delay the exchange of money a little more, since on October 18, 1883, a law has been promulgated which provides for the cancellation of obligations in the currency mentioned on this note at a rate of exchange of sixty-four centavos national currency for a Bolivian peso. The authorities are certainly aware that, over time, the depreciation with which they will convert those abusive issues will with no doubt be favorable for the provincial funds.

It will be noted that the "No". has been removed, which has made it possible to lengthen the hatched field to place the number correctly.



The Banco Provincial de Santa Fé continued to issue banknotes after the Monetary Law of 1881, then joined the system of National Guaranteed Banks in 1887. Like all other banks, it lost its issuing privilege with the creation of the Conversion fund in 1890.
